What is the Measures of Academic Progress®?

Measures of Academic Progress® is a computer-adaptive assessment tool that can be used to monitor the progress of students.

These computerized tests are adaptive and offered in *Reading, Language Usage, and Mathematics*.

When taking a MAP® test, the difficulty of each question is based on how well a student answers all of the previous questions. As the student answers correctly, questions become more difficult. If the student answers incorrectly, the questions become easier.

How is it Administered?

- MAP® is a Web-based program that students will access on computers at their school sites.
- An entire class can take part in the assessment at the same time (one child per computer).
- The assessment takes 20 to 45 minutes per child (based on the skill level and grade level of the student). For example, second graders may take about 20 minutes while a skilled fifth grader may need up to 45 minutes. Older students, such as ninth graders, also need 40 to 45 minutes to complete the assessment.
- School sites will schedule times for students to take the assessment.
- It has a high correlation to the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination (.72 correlation).
- Classroom teachers will be in the testing room serving as proctors during the assessment.

How Will it Help My Student?

MAP® assessments allow educators to develop and sustain a strong focus on a data-driven approach to student achievement. This formative assessment helps teachers pinpoint, to the goal-strand level, where students are ready to advance and where they need help.

Teachers will:

- Use the assessment data to guide district reading and math instruction at the targeted grade levels to personalize learning.
- Monitor student growth to identify academic development over time.
- Provide an opportunity for students to see their progress and chart their growth.
